They are used in morning and evening prayer, in Eucharist services, in baptisms, funerals, memorials and more. The book of Psalms is included in Anglican Prayer books.




Psalms - Psalms in Worship

In worship services with a choir or music leader the Psalm is often sung. If there is no choir, the Psalm can be read out loud in different ways. Here are 3 of the most common ways:

- A solo reader reads the whole Psalm.
- 2. A reader leads the Psalm they read the odd verses, the congregation say with the even verses.
- 3. A reader reads the first part of the verse (up to the colon) then the congregation says the second half of the verse.

With your class, look in an Anglican Prayer Book. Look at a Holy Communion service. When is the psalm said or sung? (Before and after what?)

Find the book of psalms in the Prayer Book. Find Psalm 95. As a class, have a go at reading verses 1-7 in a couple of the different ways mentioned. Discuss...
